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Course Description:

Modern cities offer a multitude of opportunities (jobs, housing, education, goods and services), but with these can come problems (like pollution, crime, and class conflict).

This course examines the problems of contemporary city life, as well as the policy initiatives aimed at addressing these problems.

There will be one mid-term test on Feb. 11, 2017. The specific materials for which you are responsible for this test will be announced in class, but will likely include all that has been covered to that point in the course, lectures as well as text readings. The test is worth 45 percent of your course grade. The test will be composed of multiple choice and true/false questions. The test is Scantron graded.

Scantron Exams: A Computer-marked multiple-choice tests and/or exams may be subject to submission for similarity review by software that will check for unusual coincidences in answer patterns that may indicate cheating.

The Final Exam will be comprehensive, and similar in format to the mid-term test.

Make-up examinations will not normally be given except in cases with documented excuses, that would be approved by the Dean of Social Sciences, the cumulative final exam could be reweighted. Both the midterm test and the final exam will normally be of the multiple-choice, true-false format. The mid-term test and the final exams may be subject to submission for similarity review by software that will check for unusual coincidences in answer patterns that may indicate cheating.

In keeping with Sociology Department "Grade Distribution Guidelines", it is expected that the class average for this course will be in the range of 66 - 70 %; should the summary grades yield a value significantly outside of this range, 'systematic grade adjustments' can be made.
