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Course Description:

This course provides a comprehensive introduction to the sociological aspects of crime in Canada. The measurement patterns, causes and social explanations of criminal behaviour will be examined.

Prerequisite(s): 1.0 from Sociology 1020, 1021E, 1025A/B, 1026F/G, 1027A/B

Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. The decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

Learning Outcomes:

At the end of this course students will be able to

- Identify, analyze and evaluate a variety of theoretical perspectives of criminology, and assess the conceptual differences among them.
- Apply theory and sociological research to interpret crime and social responses to it.
- Read, synthesize and evaluate theoretical arguments and published research on crime from a critical perspective.
- Understand and demonstrate the competent use of different quantitative and qualitative research methods.
- Demonstrate effective written communication skills and the ability to discuss ideas clearly and articulately.

Method of Evaluation:

This course is online and students will be required to participate in weekly online discussions worth 30% of your final grade. Students will also be required to write a midterm and final examination in person at your examination centre.

Weekly On-line Participation/Discussion 30% of final grade.

Midterm Examination: Saturday June 18, 2016 (End of Unit 6) (date to be confirmed) 30%

Final examination: Final Examination Period August 2-5, 2016 (pending) 40% of final grade.

All required papers may be subject to submission for textual similarity review to the commercial plagiarism detection software under license to the University for detection of plagiarism. All papers submitted for such checking will be included as source documents in the reference database for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of papers subsequently submitted to the system. Use of the service is subject to the licensing agreement, currently between The University of Western Ontario and Turnitin.com (<http://www.turnitin.com>).
