



## Criminology Frequently asked Questions

### **1) What module changes are coming to the Sociology Department?**

The Criminology Major will be discontinued starting with the 2026 Intent to Register. All students currently enrolled in the module or entering in 2025 will be able to finish the module.

### **2) What modules are not changing?**

All of the sociology modules (Honours Specialization, Specialization, Major, and Minor) as well as the Criminology minor are not changing. Power and Justice courses will continue to be offered.

### **3) Why is the Criminology Major being discontinued?**

An external quality review recommended that the department discontinue the criminology modules. The department does not have enough tenure track faculty who are criminologists. Past students have raised concerns with the quality of the program. The department will offer new and updated courses in the department's four areas of strength: 1) Health and the life course, 2) Social Demography and Migration, 3) Power and Justice, and 4) Work and the Economy.

### **4) I am a current Criminology Major student, will this change affect me?**

No, it will not. All students who enter the Criminology Major prior to September 2025 can still complete the module requirements and graduate with the Criminology Major.

### **5) Will the department offer fewer Criminology courses?**

No, the department will offer new and more courses under the area of Power and Justice. The department is updating its course material in this area. Look out for new courses in 2024-25 such as Soc 3423F/G – Rethinking Punishment, Soc 3463F/G – Crime and the City, Soc 4344F/G – Digital Data.

### **6) Where can I find out more about modules and courses offered in the Department of Sociology?**
