Participate in Western Launch

Western Launch is a transition program to help students thrive at western. Feel confident starting your academic journey at Western by participating in the free program. Programs are offered throughout the summer and academic year.

First Year

First year students are part of a Home Faculty (ex: Social Science). You may have indicated Sociology as an area of interest in your application to Western, but you are not yet part of a module or program (ex: Sociology major).

The First year of your degree is an opportunity to explore different subjects and determine your true interests and strengths. Introductory level (1000-1999) courses offer students a broad overview of a subject. Students must complete first year courses in at least 4 different subjects.



Sociology

Students interested in pursuing a Sociology module (ex: Sociology Major) should aim to complete 1.0 credits in Sociology at the 1000 level in first year.

There are a variety of 1000 level Sociology courses offered at Western and the Affiliates. Main campus students should enrol in:

Sociology 1025A/B "Society and You"

AND

Sociology 1027A/B "Life is Not Always Fair"

Each of these courses are 0.5 credits. Completing both courses with a minimum final grade of 60% will satisfy the 1.0 credit admission requirement for Sociology modules.

At the end of first year, students are given an opportunity to request entry into a module or program (Ex: Sociology Major + Psychology minor) through a process known as "Intent to Register" (ITR). Students who meet the admission requirement will be accepted into the module for the start of second year.



Course Structure

Undergraduate degrees are made up of first year (1000 level) requirements, module requirements (2000-4999 level) and electives (1000-4999 level).

Western offers courses in a 0.5 credit and 1.0 credit format.

<u>0.5 Credit</u> = one semester course (Fall or Winter)
 Fall Semester/First term: September – December.
 Winter Semester/Second term: January - April

<u>1.0 Credit</u> = full year course: September – April

First year students typically enrol in 1000 level courses. Most students enroll in 5.0 credits for the academic year with 2.5 credits in the Fall semester and 2.5 credits in the Winter semester.



Course Suffix

Course Suffix (A, B, E, F, G, blank):

The letter at the end of a course number indicates the type of course (essay, non-essay) and when the course is offered (Fall or Winter).

- A = 0.5 credit non-essay course offered in the fall semester (Sept-Dec) ex: Soc 1025A.
- B = 0.5 credit non-essay course offered in the winter semester (Jan-April) ex: Soc 1027B.
- **F** = 0.5 credit essay course offered in the fall semester (Sept-Dec) ex: Soc 3301F.
- **G** = 0.5 credit essay course offered in the winter semester (Jan-April) ex: Soc 2190G.

The Sociology Department no longer offers 1.0 credit courses that take place throughout the academic year (Sept-April) Ex: Soc 1020, Soc 1021E. Some other departments still offer this style of course.

- E = 1.0 credit full year essay course (Sept-April) ex: the former Soc 1021E (no longer offered by main campus)
- **Blank/No letter**= 1.0 credit full year non-essay course (Sept-April) ex: the former Soc 1020 (no longer offered by main campus)



Course Structure Basics

Students interested in Sociology must complete 1.0 credits in Sociology at the 1000 level. To do so, students must complete both "Sociology 1025A/B" AND "Sociology 1027A/B". The Suffix "A/B" means that the course is a 0.5 credit non-essay course with options in the fall (A) and winter (B) semesters.

Sociology 1025A "Society and You" (Fall) and Sociology 1025B "Society and You" (Winter) are the SAME course. The only difference is the semester it is offered. The course itself (Soc 1025) covers the same course content in the fall (1025A) and winter semesters (1025B). You should complete 1025A OR 1025B, but NOT both courses.

There is a great deal of flexibility in the order students complete the two courses (Sociology 1025A/B + 1027A/B) to satisfy the 1.0 credit 1000 level Sociology admission requirement:

Example 1 (different semesters): Soc 1025A (Fall) + Soc 1027B (Winter)

Example 2 (same semester): Soc 1025A (Fall) + Soc 1027A (Fall)

Example 3 (different orders): Soc 1027A (Fall) + Soc 1025B (Winter)

Example 4 (different years): Soc 1027A (Fall 2025) + Soc 1025A (Fall 2026) * this student would only be eligible to request entry into a module during ITR in March 2027 when the 1.0 credit 1000 level Sociology admission requirement would be complete.

Any combination is acceptable



Essay Requirement

All students must complete 2.0 credits of essay courses (suffix E, F, G) at some point throughout their degree.

The 2.0 essay credits include:

- 1.0 credit at any level (1000-4999) and
- 1.0 credit at the Senior level (2000-4999)

Essay courses can be completed throughout your degree and in any subject(s) of your choice.

Students are encouraged to complete some essay courses in first year (1000-1999 level) in order to gain University writing experience. Writing skills learned at an introductory level will benefit students as they complete senior level essay courses.

Essay courses must be completed at Western. A course completed as part of transfer credits, exchange or study abroad do not satisfy the essay requirement.



Breadth Requirements

All students must complete a minimum of 1.0 credits in each of the 3 Breadth categories (A, B, C). Search the <u>Academic Calendar</u> by course subject to determine which breadth category the course fulfills.

- 1.0 Category A (Social Science) ex: Sociology 1027A (0.5) + Sociology 1025B (0.5)
- 1.0 Category B (Arts & Humanities) ex: English 1020E (1.0)
- 1.0 Category C (Science) ex: EarthSci 1022A (0.5) + CompSci 1020A.

A list of popular Science (Category C) courses for Social Science students is available.

Typically, students aim to complete all breadth requirements in first year. Students must complete at least 2 categories of breadth requirements in first year (Category A + Category B or C). Remaining breadth requirements can still be completed throughout your degree if they were not completed in first year.

One course can fulfill a breath requirement + essay requirement + first year requirement all at once. Ex: English 1020E.



First Year Enrollment

Course registration is completed in Student Center ...

To register in courses, you will need an enrollment appointment. Approximately 2 to 3 days before your enrollment start date, an email will be sent to your Western email account about your enrollment appointment time. You can view your enrollment appointment time via Student Center.
Go to Academics > Course Registration > Enrollment Appointments.

Fall/Winter 2025-2026 enrollment appointment start dates for Year 1 students will occur between

June 23 and June 27


Your enrollment appointment time is the earliest date and time you can access course registration. Until this date/time is reached, you will not be able to register in courses in Student Center.

After your enrollment appointment begins, you can continue to register in courses until the end of the Fall/Winter course registration period (last day to add a course).



Course Availability

Use <u>Draft my Schedule</u> to search for course availability by subject, day/time and campus.



It is important to filter your search by selecting "Main" as the campus.

Completing a draft schedule is NOT the same as enrolling in courses. Draft My Schedule is a system used as a workbook to help you plan your course schedule before your enrollment appointment.



Anti-requisite: Courses that overlap or share similar course content. Students cannot take two courses that are listed as anti-requisite. Example: Sociology 1025A/B and Sociology 1020

Enrolment Priority/Restriction: A set of dates when specific groups of students can enrol in a course.

Pre-requisite: Enrollment in a particular year, module or course that must be successfully completed prior to registration in the course. Sociology 1000 level courses do not have a prerequisite.

Course Planning Tips

- Plan ahead by reviewing the Western Launch modules to learn the basics of the degree structure and course requirements.
- Course availability may be limited. Multiple sections of Sociology 1025A/B and 1027A/B
 are offered in Fall and Winter. Some sections of the course fill faster than others. The
 sections with your preferred day/time may be full. Please choose one of the other
 available options.
- It is helpful to create multiple draft schedule using "Draft my schedule" so that you have a backup plan. If the courses in your Draft A schedule are full, try to enroll in your Draft B schedule.
- It is best to fill your schedule on your enrollment date. The longer you wait to enrol in courses, the fewer options will be available as courses fill throughout June.
- Attend the first lecture before deciding to drop a course. You can make changes to your schedule up until the course <u>add/drop deadline</u>.
- If a course section was previously full, check the enrollment system often leading up to the add/drop deadline. Students often make last minute changes to their schedule which opens up spots in courses that were previously full.

Criminology

The Sociology department offers many modules in Sociology and some in Criminology.

New admission to the Criminology major will be discontinued effective September 1st 2026. Students completing the admission requirement (Sociology 1025A/B + 1027A/B) during the 2025-2026 academic year will NOT have the opportunity to request the Criminology major during Intent to Register in March 2026 and beyond.

Students are encouraged to enrol in a Sociology module. The courses required for the Criminology major are still being offered. Those exact same courses can be used to fulfill the Sociology major. The Sociology modules allow for more course selection options.

The Criminology minor is still available.

Course Enrollment FAQ

A course I want to take is full. What do I do?

Enrol in an available section of the course or a different course that is not full. You may need to adjust your preferences and enrol in courses that are not scheduled at your preferred day/time (ex: it may not be possible to avoid morning classes). Prioritize enrolling in required courses (Soc 1025A/B + 1027A/B) for your desired module.

Two courses I want to take are scheduled at the same time. Can I take both?

No. Students cannot enrol in courses that conflict with other courses, labs or tutorials.

I am having difficulty enrolling in Sociology courses. What do I do?

The first step is to check the prerequisite and enrollment priority listed on the course. The enrollment system will not allow students to enrol unless BOTH the prerequisite and enrollment priority are met. Contact the Registrar Live Chat for assistance.
