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Course Description:

This course will survey topics pertaining to the sociology of work. We will examine modern day work in Canada, while putting it in its historical and cross-national context. Our focus will be on a range of characteristics, debates, and social issues associated with the organization and experience of work. The first part of the course reviews the organization of work, and the impact of various organizational forms on workers' experiences and well-being. The second part of the course focuses on the potential of work to reproduce and challenge prevailing social inequalities. Finally we look at the future of work and the impact of technology.

Antirequisite(s): Sociology 2145A/B, The former Sociology 2169

Learning Outcomes:

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

- ❖ Identify, analyze and evaluate a variety of theoretical explanations of work, and assess the differences, strengths and weaknesses among them.
- ❖ Draw on theoretical explanations of work to understand their own personal experiences in the workplace.
- ***** Explain how work has changed over time.
- ❖ Understand the link between work and social inequality.
- * Recognize discrimination in the workplace and provide strategies to help improve the situation.

Method of Evaluation and Evaluation Breakdown:

Evaluation Details:

Test: A test will be conducted in person, during class time. It will involve a mix of multiple choice and short answer questions. The test will be held on Feb 7th 2022.

Final Assignment: The final assignment will consist of 2-3 questions, for which you have to provide exam-style short written answers, drawing on your knowledge of course content. Answers should be uploaded onto OWL by April 1st at noon.

Discussion Responses: On three occasions a question will be posted on OWL. You are asked to provide an answer to this post by submitting something through the 'assignment' tab on OWL. Responses should be between 200 and 300 words, and should draw on both course material and your own opinion. External sources are not recommended. There will be a total of 3 posts and each response will be marked out of 10. More details will follow, but these posts should be submitted the weeks of Jan 24, March 7, and March 14.

Important Policies

Policies for Assignment Deadlines:

Tests must be completed in the time allotted for doing so.

Assignments must be loaded onto OWL by the deadline, unless a formal extension or accommodation has been granted.

A Note on Plagiarism:

Students must write their assignments in their own words. Whenever students take an idea from another author, they must acknowledge their debt both by using quotation marks where appropriate and by proper referencing

such as footnotes or citations. Plagiarism is a major scholastic offence (the Scholastic Offence Policy can be viewed in the Western Academic Calendar).

Plagiarism Checking:

All required papers may be subject to submission for textual similarity review to the commercial plagiarism detection software under license to the University for detection of plagiarism. All papers submitted for such checking will be included as source documents in the reference database for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of papers subsequently submitted to the system. Use of the service is subject to the licensing agreement, currently between The University of Western Ontario and Turnitin.com (www.turnitin.com/).

Policies on Examinations

Electronic devices will NOT be allowed during tests.

Computer-marked multiple-choice tests and/or exams may be subject to submission for similarity review by software that will check for unusual coincidences in answer patterns that may indicate cheating.

Policy on Laptops and other Electronics/Phones in Class:

Laptops are permitted in class, but if it is observed that students are on social networking sites such as Facebook or Twitter, they will be told to close the lid and they will not be permitted to use it for the remainder of the class. Be sure that all cell phones are turned off at the beginning of class.

Academic Consideration for Missed Work

Students who are seeking academic consideration for missed work during the semester may submit a *Self-Reported Absence (SRA)* form online provided that the absence is **48 hours or less** and the other conditions specified in the <u>Senate policy</u> are met. Two important exceptions to this rule: SRAs will NOT be allowed for final examinations or assessments worth more than 30% of a given course. Students whose absences are expected to last **longer than 48 hours**, or where the other conditions detailed in the policy are not met (e.g., work is worth more than 30% of the final grade, the student has already used 2 self-reported absences, the absence is during the final exam period), may receive academic consideration by submitting a <u>Student Medical Certificate</u> (for illness) or other appropriate documentation (for compassionate grounds) to your Home Faculty Academic Counselling office.

All students pursuing academic consideration, regardless of type, must contact their instructors no less than 24 hours following the end of the period of absence to clarify how they will be expected to fulfill the academic responsibilities missed during their absence. Students are reminded that they should consider carefully the

implications of postponing tests or midterm exams or delaying submission of work, and are encouraged to make appropriate decisions based on their specific circumstances.
