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## **Course Description:**

This course is designed to introduce you to the methodological tools deployed by sociologists to conduct empirically grounded and theoretically engaged research. The course will cover the basic elements of research design, the role of theory in empirical research, the construction of sociological arguments, the ethics for social scientific research, and the analysis, interpretation, and presentation of data and results. Methodologically, this course will introduce you to the use of surveys, experiments, ethnography, interviews, comparative/historical methods, and social network analysis.

## Prerequisite(s):

You must have completed one of the following in order to take this course:

- units of Sociology courses at the 1000 level
- Indigenous Studies 1020E
- Women's Studies 1020E
- Enrolment in the Honors Specialization in Human Resource Management, Honors Specialization in Public Administration, or Specialization in Public Administration.

Note: This course is mandatory for students registered in Year 2 of an Honors Specialization offered through the Department of Sociology. Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. The decision may not appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

## **Learning Outcomes:**

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. understand what sociological research is and how sociological questions can be answered;
- 2. formulate sociologically relevant research questions and evaluate research designs;
- 3. know the basic elements of different of methodological approaches and understand their merits and limitations; 4. appreciate the challenges and complexity of sociological research;
- 4. understand the ethical considerations involved in doing human subjects research; and
- 5. develop skills for reading and critically thinking about empirical research.

#### **Important Policies**

#### Policies for Assignment Deadlines:

If you know that you have a problem with a due date or an exam (conflict, sick, etc), let's talk about it as soon as possible. If you talk to me ahead of time, we can determine together whether a formal accommodation request should be filed or whether we can work out another arrangement.

If you do not or are not able to let me know ahead of time, then you will be asked to go through the formal academic accommodation process. If you miss an exam due to illness or for any other unforeseen reason, please notify me within 24 hours of the missed exam. You then must provide notification and documentation to your Academic Counselor within 48 hours. If your problem is medical in nature, you should be seen by your doctor on the date of the exam or on the date an assignment is due. If your Academic Counselor agrees that your reasons are legitimate and are supported by your medical doctor's documentation, you will be allowed to write a make-up exam at a later date.

If a student misses a test with legitimate reason, you will be assigned an accommodated test online. In cases where there is no approved justification for the absence, the student will receive a grade of zero on the exam.

If an assignment is late with no communication, there will be a 5% late penalty per day for up to 10 days past the due date. At that point, assignment will no longer be accepted. If a student anticipates an issue with an assignment, they are recommended to speak to their Professor and / or TA as early as possible to discuss options.

#### A Note on Plagiarism:

Students must write their assignments in their own words. Whenever students take an idea from another author, they must acknowledge their debt both by using quotation marks where appropriate and by proper referencing such as footnotes or citations. Plagiarism is a major scholastic offence (the Scholastic Offence Policy can be viewed in the Western Academic Calendar).

#### Plagiarism Checking:

All required papers may be subject to submission for textual similarity review to the commercial plagiarism detection software under license to the University for detection of plagiarism. #### Academic Consideration for Missed Work

Students who are seeking academic consideration for missed work during the semester may submit a *Self-Reported Absence (SRA)* form online provided that the absence is **48 hours or less** and the other conditions specified in the <u>Senate policy</u> are met. Two important exceptions to this rule: SRAs will NOT be allowed for final examinations or assessments worth more than 30% of a given course. Students whose absences are expected to last **longer than 48 hours**, or where the other conditions detailed in the policy are not met (e.g., work is worth more than 30% of the final grade, the student has already used a self-reported absence, the absence is during the final exam period), may receive academic consideration by submitting a <u>Student Medical Certificate</u> (for illness) or other appropriate documentation (for compassionate grounds) to your Home Faculty Academic Counselling office.

All students pursuing academic consideration, regardless of type, must contact their instructors no less than 24 hours following the end of the period of absence to clarify how they will be expected to fulfill the academic responsibilities missed during their absence. Students are reminded that they should consider carefully the implications of postponing tests or midterm exams or delaying submission of work, and are encouraged to make appropriate decisions based on their specific circumstances.
