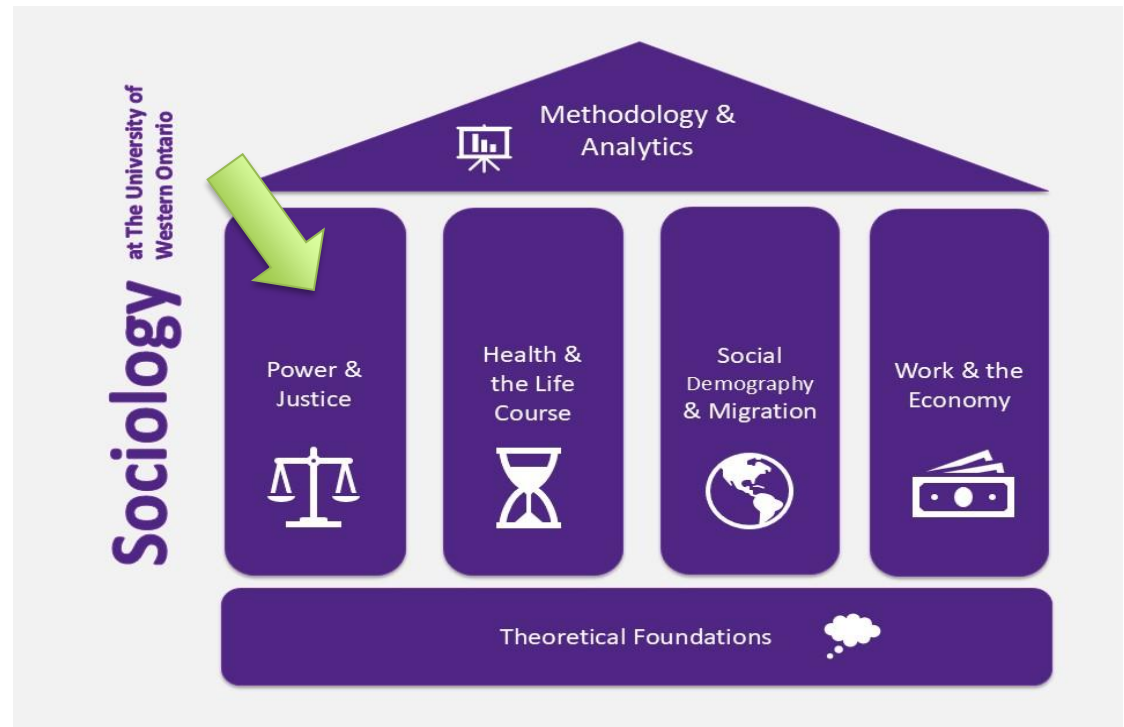

Criminology Major

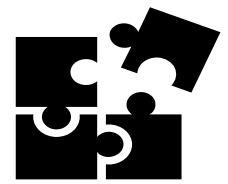

Degree Requirements



The degree is similar to a puzzle. Each 0.5 credit course is a puzzle piece used to complete the entire puzzle. One puzzle piece (course) can only fill one spot (requirement) in the puzzle (degree/module).

The 4 year degree consists of 20.0 total credits. The diagram below is a visual representation of the 20.0 credits split into the necessary categories:

Module Requirements

- *Most* module courses do NOT need to be completed in a particular year or in a particular order. Please pay close attention to pre-requisites and enrollment priorities.
- Students are encouraged to enrol in a mix of module courses and electives/other module courses each year.
- Students can complete the following Sociology courses based on year of study:
 - 2nd year: 1000 , 2000 and some 3000 level
 - 3rd year: 1000 , 2000 , 3000 and some 4000 level
 - 4th year: All levels (1000-4000)
- All 2000 level module requirements do NOT need to be completed in 2nd year. It is common for 3rd and 4th year students to complete some 2000 level courses.
- When filling out the checklist, pay close attention to the rules regarding double counting courses, course substitutions and antirequisites.

Module Courses

Question: Do I need to complete courses in all 4 areas of Sociology for a Criminology module?

Answer: No. Criminology students most commonly complete courses in the “Power & Justice” area to satisfy the 2100-2999 and 3000-4999 range. Students completing a Criminology module still have the flexibility to complete Sociology courses in any of the 4 areas of Sociology.

Students commonly complete many courses from the list. Courses not used to fulfill the 1.0 credit requirement can be used elsewhere in the module (if appropriate), toward another module or as an elective. Examples include:

- Soc 2261A + Anthropology 2238B satisfy the 1.0 credit requirement from the list.
- Soc 2228A + 2257B + 2267B can be used to satisfy the 1.5 credit 2100-2999 level requirement for the Criminology major.
- Philosophy 2080 counts as a 1.0 credit elective.
- Psychology 2032B may counts toward a Psychology module (ex: student is enrolled in the Criminology major + Psychology minor combination). Contact Psychology department to confirm.

Pre-Requisite

Pay close attention to pre-requisites when enrolling in courses. Successful completion of the pre-requisite course (ex: Soc 2266A/B) will provide students with a foundation for future learning and success in a future course (ex: Soc 2267A/B).

Solution: Complete the pre-requisite course first:

- A) In the same year: Soc 2266A in Fall 2026 and Soc 2267B in Winter 2027
- B) In different years: Soc 2266B in Winter 2027 and Soc 2267A in Fall 2027

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The full year course Law 2101 (1.0 credit) is no longer offered. Instead, Law 2101 is replaced with two 0.5 credit courses:

The Sociology department will accept one or both of these 0.5 credit Law courses to be used toward the fulfillment of the 1.0 credit requirement for the list on the Criminology major.

If you have already completed Law 2101, do NOT complete Law 2201A/B or Law 2401A/B as these courses are anti-requisite.

Question: Can I take a Sociology course at King's?

Answer: *Students completing a main campus Sociology or Criminology module must complete the module requirements on main campus. Sociology courses completed at King's will count as an elective only. The course can NOT be used to fulfill a main campus Sociology or Criminology module requirement.*

Question: Can I complete 2000 level courses in 3rd year?

Answer: Yes! All 2000 level courses listed on the module do not need to be completed specifically in 2nd year. Students can complete 2000-2999 level courses in 2nd, 3rd and 4th year. Similarly, 3000-3999 level courses can be completed throughout 3rd and 4th year.

Question: I am combining two Sociology + Criminology modules. I noticed both modules require Soc 2205A/B and 2206A/B. What do I do?

A 1.0 credit exclusion applies when combining Sociology and Criminology modules where both modules require Soc 2205A/B “Statistics for Sociology” and 2206A/B “Research Methods in Sociology”.

Question: I am completing a Sociology and Criminology module combination. I noticed there are similarities between the two modules. Can I count a courses twice?

Answer: Double counting a course is **NOT** permitted. A course used for one module cannot be used again in another section of the module or toward another module. *One course fulfills ONE requirement.*

Sociology Specialization + Criminology major: This combination takes into account the 1.0 credit exclusion for Soc 2205/2206. Students must complete 9.0 credits for the Sociology Specialization and 5.0 credits of *different* courses for the Criminology major.

Sociology Major + Criminology Major: This combination also takes into account the 1.0 credit exclusion for Soc 2205/2206. Students must complete 6.0 credits for the Sociology Major and 5.0 credits of *different* courses for the Criminology major.

Sociology Major + Criminology Minor: The 1.0 credit exclusion does **NOT** apply with this combination as the minor does not require Soc 2205A/B and Soc 2206A/B. Students must complete 6.0 credits for the Sociology Major and 4.0 credits of *different* courses for the Criminology major.

Soc 2205A/B and 2206A/B requirement on the Criminology major is excluded, making the Criminology major 5.0 credits instead of 6.0 credits.

The Sociology + Criminology double major is 11.0 credits combined instead of 12.0 credits.

Soc 2263A/B “Thinking Sociologically” is a core course. When combining Sociology and Criminology modules, **a substitution is required**. An exclusion does NOT apply. Soc 2263A/B will count toward the Sociology module.

Students must then substitute the Soc 2263A/B requirement on the Criminology major with a 0.5 credit Sociology 2000-4999 level course (ex: Soc 2222B). The substitute course cannot be a course already counted elsewhere in the Sociology or Criminology module.

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Double counting a course is not permitted within a module or between 2 modules. Examples include:

- A) [Soc 2205A](#) fulfill a 0.5 credit core module requirement for the Sociology major. It cannot be counted again toward the 2000-3999 requirement on the Sociology major or Criminology major.
- B) [Soc 2257B](#) fulfills 0.5 credit from the list on the Criminology major. It cannot be counted again toward the 2100-2999 level requirement on the Criminology major or 2000-3999 on the Sociology major.
- C) [Soc 3358F](#) fulfills a 0.5 credit 3000-4999 level requirement on the Criminology major. It cannot be counted again toward the 3000-4999 level requirement on the Sociology major.

Question: I am completing a Double Major in Criminology + Psychology. Both modules require a Statistics course. What should I do?

Answer: This situation is common when completing a double major in a variety of subjects/departments (not only Crim + Psych). Many departments and modules require Statistic courses. Due to similarities in course content, some courses are anti-requisite. **It is the student's responsibility to review the anti-requisites before enrolling in courses. Do not enrol in anti-requisite courses.**



SOCIOLOGY 2205A/B STATISTICS FOR SOCIOLOGY

An introduction to the techniques of statistical analysis used by sociologists, including descriptive statistics, the normal curve, hypothesis testing and various measures of association.

- B) Complete a Psychology statistics course as outlined on the Psychology major requirements (ex: Psych 2811A). This course will NOT fulfill the Sociology major statistics requirement. **Substitution instructions are included on the Criminology major checklist:**

Course substitution: Students who complete an anti-requisite course to [Sociology 2205A/B](#) must substitute the module requirement with a 0.5 credit Sociology course at the 2000-4999 level. The same rule applies to anti-requisite courses to [Sociology 2206A/B](#). The substitution ensures students complete 6.0 Sociology credits for the Major.

Question: I am completing a Double Major in Criminology + Psychology. Both modules require a Research Methods course. What should I do?

Answer: Many departments and modules require a Research Method courses. Due to similarities in course content, some courses are anti-requisite. The list of anti-requisites is much smaller for Research Methods than for Statistics courses.

It is the student's responsibility to review the anti-requisites before enrolling in courses. Do not enrol in anti-requisite courses.

A Research methods substitution is required for other module combinations where the courses are listed as anti-requisite (ex: Criminology + Political Science double major etc). Contact the appropriate department for more information.

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Question:

I am completing a double Major in Criminology + Psychology. Can I count Psych 2032B toward the Criminology Major AND the Psychology major?

Answer:

No. Double counting is not permitted within the module or between two Social Science modules. If Psych 2032B is used to fulfill 0.5 credits toward the Psychology major, it can NOT also be counted toward the 0.5 credits from the list on the Criminology major. If Psych 2032B is not used toward the Psychology major, it can be used toward the Criminology major.

One course fulfills one module requirement. This ensures 6.0 credits are completed for the Criminology major and 6.0 credits of *different* courses are used toward the other major.
